Module Aims

Understanding heritage and archaeology practice is the key component in creating primary evidence in these disciplines. This module is built on field skills gained in Archaeological Practice (Level 5) to provide students with more formal training in the more specialised skills necessary in professional archaeology or heritage practice. Viewed as an intensive field course equivalent to lab classes/practice experience in other disciplines.

Outline Syllabus

The module has a practical component of at least 3 weeks. It will train students in the use of advanced professional practice under close supervision by experienced practitioners. These may focus on site survey (surface and sub-surface) using industry standard electronic equipment or fieldwork within a heritage organisation. There may also be training in fieldwork stratagies and methods, site planning, artefact and ecofact processing which develops the skills gained in Archaeological Fieldwork. The module will include fieldwork, usually on various School field research programmes, each organised by their own Field Director to enable students to consolidate and reflect upon skills acquired in the more formal taught sessions. An element of post-excavation is included back in Bradford.

The module will typically run during the summer months between completion of 2nd year and the beginning of 3rd year study. However, exceptional circumstances may require adjustment of this timing, and there is potential flexibility to allow for specific individual circumstances.

Outcome Number	Description			
1	Use at an advanced level the appropriate methodologies in archaeological or heritage fieldwork offered by the archaeological experience. This is dependent on the field programme but may include excavation, recording, sampling, survey, environmental processing, and artefact processing. Where appropriate, understand the organisation of material for post-excavation.			
2	Select and apply practical techniques of archaeological or heritage fieldwork such as survey, geophyical survey,excavation, artefact and ecofact processing.

Learning, Teaching and Assessment Strategy

Practical fieldwork, heritage recording, and post-excavation activities, with lectures. Feedback provided in field as well as written feedback. In addition, there will be review and comments to field handbooks following Weeks 1 and 2. Evening lectures may occur with some projects to provide context to the research and fieldwork. The module concludes with some post-excavation experience via seminar situations.

Students will be assessed on the quality of their field notes and field and post-excavation techniques, and on their teamwork skills.
