<p>The aim of this module is to provide you with a critical understanding of the principles and regulation governing the use, sharing and protection of transboundary freshwater resources. This will be through a written coursework of 4,000 words or equivalent. This is to help ensure that you can apply complex legal reasoning to issues relating to water resources regulation. The coursework will require the use of independent research, critical and analytical skills. You will also be expected to use appropriate legal terminology and written communication. The formative and summative assessments are aimed at testing your ability to meet the learning outcomes of the module.</p>
