Module Aims
<p>This module enables learners to:</p> <p>(a) develop the capacity to conduct independent and advanced research; (b) advance relevant theoretical and policy arguments and recommendations for reforms in their area of LLM specialisation; and (c) acquire a range of transferable skills such as independent study, effective written and oral communication and problem solving. It requires reflection on the implications for personal development and professional practice.</p>

Outline Syllabus
<ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. Identify and justify a legal issue that is of strategic relevance within the LLM programme</li> <li>2. Obtain ethical approval for the research</li> <li>3. Critically analyse sources of law and policy, institutions and processes on the selected issue</li> <li>4. Evaluate the relevance of alternative legal arguments and approaches for the issue</li> <li>5. Formulate realistic and appropriate legal arguments and make recommendations that are well grounded in legal theory and practice</li> <li>6. Develop and present a dissertation, with a bibliography, to reflect the above elements (1 - 5).</li> </ol>

Learning, Teaching and Assessment Strategy
<p>Learners will undertake 8 hours of introductory seminars in Semester 2 (Spring). These will be 2-hour seminars, scheduled over 4 weeks.</p> <p>A total of 20 hours supervision time is allocated, out of which three hours is intended to be used as one-to-one contact time with the supervisor.</p> <p>The module will include 8 hours of interactive sessions with a lecturer, in Semester 2 (Spring). These preparatory sessions will cover research methods, ethics, referencing, etc.</p> <p>Learners work largely independently and should initiate and maintain regular contact with their supervisor during the dissertation research and writing. Learners should submit research questions for approval and allocation of supervisor. Learners are also responsible for obtaining ethical approval for their research from the University of Bradford's Ethics Committee.</p> <p>The supervisor's role is to guide and offer feedback as learners go through the module. Therefore, consistent and early engagement with your supervisor is essential. There should be three hours of contact time with the supervisor, typically involving three to four meetings (virtual or in person), subject to the agreement between the learner and the supervisor.</p> <p>Summative Dissertation or Project Report Dissertation 70%  Summative Coursework - Written Research proposal 30%  Formative Coursework ?
