Learning, Teaching and Assessment Strategy

Workshops on the dissertation and research methods will be offered at the beginning of the year, to support you in understanding the aims and objectives of the modules, expectations in the supervision process, and the criteria that will be applied in the assessment stage.

The dissertation process will be supervised by an academic with relevant expertise. Meetings will be arranged in connection with key steps in the dissertation process, with the purpose of providing feedback on your work and skill development. This will include detailed feedback on elements of draft work at an advanced stage of development.

The assessment strategy for the dissertation has formative and summative elements. A supervisor will provide formative feedback throughout the process on your topic, research design, and early drafts of some parts of the dissertation. Summative assessment has two main elements: assessment of your research process, and assessment of the product of the research process - the dissertation itself. You will be required to document your working process in a portfolio, submitting this with a short reflection on learning alongside the dissertation.
