Module Aims

To enable you to reflect critically on your own social work practice in preparation for and during your second placement and to enhance your skills in drawing on literature to inform your work, relating theory to practice and understanding the role of values within your practice.

This module includes 5 Skills Days. These sessions are within the class-based content of the Practice Learning 2 module. These Skills Days are in addition to the 100 practice placement days. The skills days make up the last 5 mandatory days of the 30 skills days.

Outline Syllabus

Reflective practice; communication skills;models and methods of assessment; risk assessment; values andethics characteristics of practice within a range of organisational settings including group care, within statutory voluntary and private sectors; the integration of theoretical perspectives within the implementation of effective social work; the relationship between justice, care and control in social welfare and the practical and ethical implications of these; discussion of social work values and key roles in respect of work undertaken on placement.

Learning, Teaching and Assessment Strategy

Group discussion, practice placement, lectures, joint University and placement tutor visits. You will compile an evidence file and practice learning assignment to assess the learning outcomes of the module. You will be required to pass a series of exercises/tasks and self-assessment reports including attendance monitoring, that are designed to test out capabilities developed by the end of the final placement.

Module teaching to be undertaken alongside the placement element. This includes 5 skills days. These sessions are within the class-based content of the Practice Learning 2 module.
