- * To contribute to assessment, planning and intervention in work with people who have mental health needs, including situations involving risk;
- * To work to promote wellbeing and recovery;
- * To be able to promote the rights of people with lived experience of social work and to challenge oppression and discrimination.

Mental Health through the lifespan; policies, & legislation; social and medical models; recovery; people with lived experience of social work; rights; community care; assessment & care planning; managing risk; multidisciplinary, interagency and multiagency working; people with lived experience of social work involvement and participation including services led by people with lived experience of social work; impact of culture, race, gender, sexuality & social class; mental health & substance / alcohol use; adult mental health & child welfare; mental health of children & young people.
